

Our new Priest-in-Charge, Rev Denise took our Harvest All Together service and experienced the church in all its autumn glory for the first time.

The Altar Guild had decorated the porch, windows, font, pulpit and Altar with stunning arrangements of flowers, fruit and veg.

Small items of agricultural and dairy paraphernalia were also displayed.

The effect was glorious and Hilary (CW) and I were thrilled and very thankful that so many people had worked so hard.

We were also very fortunate to welcome Ann Hatton, from the 'Ripple Effect Charity' who talked to us about this organisation.

The name is the recent rebrand of the original 'Send a Cow' charity, which started in 1988, when a few local Christian farmers sent dairy heifers to impoverished areas of Africa, to women widowed by war and famine. The cows revolutionised these women's lives, their children's health improved and they could go to school, surplus milk was sold, the women became entrepreneurs, small businesses evolved, the ripples spread.





Since that small start over 4 million people have been affected, hence the new name.

'Ripple' no longer sends European personnel to Africa, but sends funds to finance new initiatives deemed effective by local-staff.

It was great to hear this from someone as closely involved as Ann.

We sang hymns old and new, watched slides and prayed thankfully at our good fortune living in a country that is so fertile.

Coffee and chat followed, for nearly as long as the formal service.



BIRD NEWS

Following the note last month regarding the Peregrine seen from the Marine Lake, Steve Spratt from Duck Lane got in touch to say that remarkably he had witnessed the incident too. He was also able to provide more detail in that the prey was a black bird not a Blackbird, namely a Jackdaw. There was another sighting of a Peregrine there on the 11th from another swimmer.

Lit seems that if you wish to spot a Peregrine go for a swim in the Marne Lake!

The unsettled weather produced a passage of migrants along the sea wall.
Ringed Plovers were observed in record numbers, 500 at Clevedon and 300 (probably part of the Clevedon flock) at Kingston Seymour.

À few more unusual small waders accompanied them, with Sanderling, Curlew Sandpiper and Little Stint, of note.

An unprecedented influx of Glossy Ibis into the South West included over 90 birds that arrived at Chew and Blagdon reservoirs and a probable Glossy at Kingston Seymour.

The White Tailed Eagle that had visited Chew Valley Lake returned for a couple of days and Jill and I were fortunate to see it, at one time mobbed by a Red Kite which appeared very small.

The Eagle reportedly predated Herring Gull, Coot and Cormorant- I was hoping it would thin out the Canada Goose flock.

The change from unsettled weather on the 20th brought a big passage of Meadow Pipits on the estuary and inland with Wheatear and Whinchat.

Skylarks were possibly on the move too although it is difficult to tell how many are local birds.

Most of our local Swallows have departed now but birds from further north are still passing through. October is the month for Finch and Woodpigeon migration.

Update from Tessa Munt, MP for Kenn

I hosted my first 'youth' surgeries this summer and it was so interesting to hear from young people about their hopes and concerns.

It is likely that today's 12 year olds and upwards will be able to vote at the next General Election and it's good to know what the next generation really cares about.

In my last update, I shared my concerns about waterway maintenance and future flooding in Somerset.

In August, I attended the South West Association of Drainage Authorities (SWADA) emergency meeting about the situation with the Environment Agency and,

when Parliament returned in early September, I requested Ministerial intervention.

It has been great this summer to visit some excellent local charities and organisations, including Prickles Hedgehog Rescue, the Somerset Armed Forces Cadets and Somerset Wildlife Trust.

There is so much going on and it's a real privilege to recognise the efforts of those who volunteer, support and take responsibility for so much activity locally.

Outside my 'patch', I met the specialists at the Royal Marsden Hospital working with the latest Radiotherapy machines. Many of you will know I've pressed the Government for many years on the availability of up-to-date machines in the NHS. I was also interviewed by Channel 4 News on research into the condition ME, on which I continue to campaign.

I'm running 'surgeries' across the area, so please come along.

Our Monthly Missive from The Limes.

It's been a bit of a turbulent summer so I feel it is time to return to items of a more local nature. Therefore as we approach the season of "Mists and mellow fruitfulness" (John Keates), I thought I'd share how my garden and orchard have gone this year.

We had a warm spring which in the main gave everything a good start. In some years the blossom on my fruit trees comes all at once but this year the trees blossomed in sequence according to their type and variety. First the cherries and apricots, then damsons and plums and then the various apples in order of early to late fruiting.

Sometimes the blossom is destroyed by cold winds and a frost can also prevent fertilisation. Pollination – or to be more accurate, fertilisation - is not instantaneous. When a pollen grain reaches the stigma of a flower it travels down a pollen tube to complete the fertilisation and this can take up to a week. Untoward weather in that time can hinder or halt the process. However this year it does seem to have gone reasonably well, with the exception of the cherry tree which seemed a bit sparse.

Actually I have two cherry trees, the newer one is a Morello cherry which I'm hoping the birds won't like. Unfortunately I think I've planted it in too shady a place so it is not prospering as it should.

Apart from the cherries which I don't even bother to harvest as its too much of a fight with the birds, whose timing is impeccable, the apricots were the first crop to appear. Last year I had very few so this year I was pleased to see a reasonable number and most of them are now in my freezer. Although most of my crops are given away my spirit of generosity does not apply to apricots and I'm hanging onto them.

I had a good crop of damsons compared to last year and the tree is small enough to make picking easy. Because it is a stone fruit I pruned it immediately after harvesting, which is probably a bit late in the year. Whether it was the right thing to do or not I don't really know but it seemed to make sense. Doubtless readers can put me right.

The plums this year were "so so" with the notable advantage of very few fungal infections, presumably due to the dry weather. From forming and developing to the right size and then ripening took longer than I expected. I could probably have delayed harvesting by three weeks or so but hey, if you cook them with the stones still in you won't know the difference.

Friends helped pick the plums and at the time of writing there are still some remaining at the top of the tree, tantalisingly just out of reach. Over the years this particular tree has grown a bit too large for easy picking and I notice some limbs are splitting or getting a little rotten. Therefore I have procured and planted another plum tree to take over in the future. Unfortunately I can't remember what variety I ordered! All I know it is yellow.

I only have one cooking apple tree – a Bramley, which always appears too vigorous, with the drawback that I am always tempted to prune it severely. If I do succumb to temptation the tree gets its own back the next year with even more growth.

Anyway I think at the moment we understand one another so there is a guarded neutrality in our relationship. In terms of cropping, this year isn't brilliant but better than last year. Because of the drought the apples are much smaller than usual which means the apple peeling devices you can get at least have a chance of working.

My other trees are eating apples. My early tree produced really sweet apples in abundance. A couple of the other trees have extremely small apples. One of them has done that in the past and is in danger of being replaced. Interestingly however, with the recent rain, some of the apples have swollen over the last two weeks so there is some hope.

Outside of the orchard my soft fruit has had mixed success. Two of the gooseberry bushes decided to die in the spring. Normally I propagate my own bushes but this time I decided to get new stock so purchased a couple of bushes which I think are doing well.

My blackcurrants also had two die, but as one was over 40 years old I suppose it had an excuse. The crop from the remaining one was ample and harvesting took several days of part time backbreaking work. I was worried the birds would beat me to it but I notice that berries I missed have been ignored.

Rhubarb was as plentiful as ever but for reasons I can't remember not a lot got picked. Raspberries seemed very confused as to what they should do. My late ones cropped early and then recently had another go. I might pull some of them up as they are a pain to harvest and if you're not careful you get stains all over your clothes.

Anyway enough of that. How do I manage all this produce? You might think harvesting all this is a lot of work and you would be correct. You might also wonder what I do with it all.

Firstly I have good friends who come along and give a hand and yes, it takes a lot of time and many visits as we try to match the ripening with the harvesting. Without this help I would be stuck. I am in a better position than many in this regard. It has been a bumper year for apples and harvesting can be a problem. I know people who are happy to have the produce if you pick it but won't come and help, even though they are physically able to. I know of an orchard in north Bristol several times the size of mine and they have no-one to pick the fruit so every year it is mown over. It seems such a waste. When I was a kid I read children's stories of boys "scrumping" apples and getting in trouble or being chased by the owner but it was a different world. It's hard to imagine boys of today stealing apples. Fruit and healthy eating are probably far from their minds!

So what do I do with it? In the past we could have stored most of it for our use over the year but times have changed. It is too much for me. I could chainsaw the orchard but I view it as an investment for the future and I am its current guardian.

Instead, the produce goes elsewhere, especially to folk who can really benefit from it. Again good friends are useful. They have good contacts and we have developed a sort of distribution system. Some produce has to be disposed of quite quickly - such as plums – or cooked and frozen, whilst apples for example can last a long time. In any event it does get moved on and sometimes I get lengthy notes of where it has gone, places ranging from Bristol to Weston, which makes it feel a little more worthwhile.

- <u>Local information</u> thanks to those clearing an area at junction with Colehouse Lane.
 Historic boundary stone needs to be reinstated. Update on local bus to Southmead.
 Discussion about the Nailsea housing developments' impact on the sewerage system which impacts the moors does not seem to come within planning considerations.
- Road sign issues (horse advisory, missing boundary sign) have been reported to NSC.
