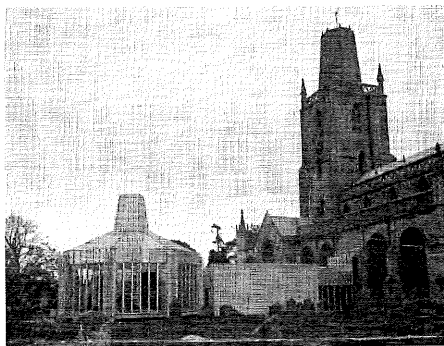

The Chapter House—50 years old

On 17th December 1975 a Dedication Eucharist, celebrated by the Bishop of Taunton, took place in St Mary's—a Thanksgiving service for the completion of the Chapter House. Below is an article by an unknown author giving a brief overview of that momentous time

In 1971 an editorial in the parish magazine put forward a suggestion that the Church Hall was too big an expense for the Church to run, and had become in reality a 'social' centre for the village. By the spring of 1974 the Parish Council and the Church Council came to an agreement for the purchase of the Hall for the use by the whole village. From the capital realised, the Church Council was then able to go ahead with its plans for the Chapter House. By July plans had been before both the Church authorities and the local authorities and received approval.

Work began in September 1974 and so did the rain. The foundations, all of which are at least six feet deep, were dug by voluntary help and for the first two months the only evidence of achievement was mud. The stone, quarried from Doultling and costing about £3.50 a block, was laid professionally and completed in January 1975. Volunteers followed with the



construction of the roof to the ancillary parts and then the whole of the Chapter House roof itself. ONLY the roof finishes were contracted out. The vast amount of internal work was by then underway and since the middle of 1975 virtually everything internally has been achieved by volunteers.

It is not possible to calculate the man hours put in, but it is possible to say that from the major jobs to the tiniest jobs, some five dozen or more men, women and children have been involved. Tribute must be paid, however, to some dozen and a half men who have put in hours and hours of work. The bulk of the work has naturally been carried out in the evenings and on Saturdays.

The total cost of the building is approximately £32,000, plus another £1500 for furnishings, ie the Heuga tiling and the curtains especially. The building is insured for £60,000. So it is not unreasonable to say that the whole project would have cost

double what it has if we had contracted out the whole. We have had many problems and the building can be faulted but we defy anyone to fault the labour given by so many so freely and willingly.

The 'castle in the air' is now hopefully going to be used in reality for the better and more effective witness to our faith in God Almighty, and the more thorough care of His children in understanding, compassion and social life.

We certainly knew him in church. A note in the office reminded keyholders to make sure he wasn't inside when we locked up, and I recall one occasion when he was most reluctant to leave. Who could forget the scuffle with the church warden when she exercised her authority to remove a troublemaker from the church? (The scratches healed eventually.) We couldn't find the photo which appeared in the paper of Merlin appearing to pay respects to the photo of the late Queen. I well recall seeing Merlin shoot past the choir to sit in the minister's chair behind the nave altar, while they were standing. One of God's creatures has gone: rest in peace, Merlin.



Autumn jobs to do in the garden

Autumn is the transition between summer and winter, meteorologically it is the months September – November, and conditions can vary between mellow, warm days of soft sunshine, to mists or rain and gales. It is also a time of harvesting in the fruit and vegetable garden.

Gather fruit for use or to store over the winter. Get a recipe book or search the internet to make pies, crumbles, jams, chutney or freeze them.

Clear crops as they go over, and add them to the compost heap.

Start a new compost bin, using some old pallets or a dalek type plastic bin.

Plant bulbs, at a depth twice the size of the bulb.

Daffodils and crocus should be planted as soon as possible, tulips in November. Tulips are good for containers. Remember to pot some daffodils for the spring show in March!

Keep dead-heading dahlias and other flowers to keep the display going. Later in the season, seedheads on herbaceous plants and grasses should be left on to provide food and shelter for birds and insects, and to provide winter interest in the garden.

Lift dahlia tubers and other tender tubers such as Cannas and Callas, dry off and store in a frost free place over winter. Alternatively leave them in the ground and cover with a mulch of leaves and compost.

Autumn is a good time to plant trees and hardy shrubs, including fruit trees and bushes. Firm well in and water to settle the roots. Trees should be staked and tied securely to prevent them from blowing over in the wind.

Divide and replant herbaceous perennials if they are getting overgrown or looking tired, saving the best shoots from the outside of the clump, and digging in new compost in the soil to improve it.

Plant autumn onion sets and garlic, sow broad beans in November on the plot, or sow in a cold frame or unheated greenhouse if mice are a problem.

Plant or transplant spring cabbages in September/October, 18" apart, or 6" apart for spring greens. Remember to put nets over to protect from pigeons.

Cut long growth off roses to prevent winter winds from rocking and damaging them.

Prune climbing roses, removing the oldest shoots and replacing with new young growths where possible, whilst maintaining the main framework.



Sow salads such as mizuna, mustards, lambs lettuce and winter lettuces. In September they can be sown outside in a sunny, sheltered spot, or sown in pots or trays indoors or in a greenhouse for winter use.

Lift root crops such as carrots and potatoes, dry them off and store in a frost and rodent- free place. Parsnips and leeks can be left in the ground until you need them.

Gaza – Hope for the Future?

Some weeks ago at the height of intense Israeli action in Gaza City we had a Message from Mariann, a teacher we know at the Lighthouse School which the Hope Christian Trust supports in Gaza City. She wrote *“Life in Gaza has become unbearable... the home I built through years of hard work... is completely destroyed... every corner of that home carried hope, sacrifice and memories and now it has all turned to ashes.”* She went on to describe her feelings and the pain she felt watching her children suffer living in the cramped environment of the Catholic Church compound. She concluded her Message to us with these words – *“And still I believe that every long night there is a dawn, and that God’s mercy never fades. I cling to hope, because amid all this destruction, it’s the only thing we have left.”*

Is the ceasefire declared some two weeks ago the dawn for which Mariann has hoped and prayed? A glimmer of hope perhaps but a sun surrounded by the clouds of uncertainty, poverty, and an unknown future in an environment of incredible destruction, mental and often physical, pain.

Another friend wrote to us the day after the declaration of the ceasefire...*“We thank God for the first time in two years I have reached the beach... how wonderful it is to breathe in the beautiful sea air”* He went on to describe how more food was coming in and prices had dropped (we have been sending him money regularly to buy food for children near the school – some £7,500 in dollars this year). The acrid smell of burning has gone, the fear of attack or of moving around has gone, although fighting between Hamas and family clans continue, everyone can sleep at night... but will the ceasefire hold?

Our friend says *“Some people have started to return who have homes they can live in but there are large numbers waiting for the crossing to Egypt to open to travel to places like Australia if they have visas—and if they have the money (often up to \$10K per individual)”*.

But what of Mariann and her young family? She will be hoping the Lighthouse School will reopen and her salary will provide enough for her and her children to live. It certainly is the plan to reopen the school as soon as possible but people are living in tents in the grounds who need to move on and some repairs need to be done to make it a safe place for children. The Trust will need to help her to find a place to live and to help give her hope and a future realising “the bright dawn” for which she has prayed in faith. Please continue to pray into the situation and Gaza’s future.
